

AGL Gloucester Gas Project community update.

Hydraulic fracturing at Waukivory complete.

Last week AGL completed hydraulically fracturing the last of four wells comprising the Waukivory Pilot Program. Since the start of operations five weeks ago, AGL's contractors fractured 19 zones, collecting data not just about coal seams but also water and the local environment. We detected no discernable impact on ground or surface water in the area.

In the coming weeks crews will complete the wells and install the pumps used to remove water from the wells. The flowback water will be sent to an EPA-licensed facility and the produced water will be blended and used for irrigation at our Tiedmans property. This will allow gas and water flows to be evaluated, giving us fuller understanding of the gas resources in the area.

All of this is important work. Not only is the Waukivory Pilot Program a key condition of our license for the Gloucester Gas Project, but the information we are gathering now will help confirm and add to our existing models of the Gloucester Basin.

We also know that there has been some disruption to the community while the hydraulic fracturing was underway, and we have worked to keep our impacts to a minimum. AGL is committed to being a good neighbour in Gloucester.
